Local Resident Wins World Championship!

Earlier this month, my Vancouver-based chorus, Lions Gate Chorus (*pictured above*) competed in an International **Competition and for the first time ever, we won the** gold medal! I'm incredibly proud of this accomplishment; we all worked so hard to achieve this goal. No matter how I'm feeling, joining with 96 other voices lifts my spirit and brings me so much joy. I feel so lucky to have found this group, with whom I've been singing for nearly 17 years. Thank you, Meghan Fell.

Thank you Meghan for this wonderful contribution and congratulations to you and all of the Lions Gate Chorus! International Champions! Gold Medal! Holy smokes! Paul, RCC News editor Vancouver a cappella group breaks records and brings home the gold at international championship competition!

Lions Gate Chorus, a Vancouverbased chorus of 100 a cappella singers, secured the title of International Champions on November 4th 2023, at the 75th Annual Sweet Adelines International Convention and Competition in Louisville, Kentucky, with recordbreaking scores.

This is the first time in the chorus' 69 year history to win the coveted international gold medal. Not only did Lions Gate win the contest, but they were also the first chorus in Sweet Adelines history to receive a perfect score in any category from the panel of judges.


The group is well-known in the global barbershop singing community for their creative shows and musical excellence. Moments before the announcement of their championship title, Lions Gate was also named the audience's choice for "Most Entertaining Chorus" of the competition — an award they won in 2009, 2017, and 2019.



Or 30 or 40 years, even less, before I join him beyond the ol pearly gates. Till then Dad...be good. Thank you to Rev. Sylvia Schmidt for presiding over the ceremony at First Lutheran Church and to everyone who attended and volunteered. It was a wonderful send-off!

Yes, my father was quite a little rascal it seems when he wasn't delivering his papers down Kingsway. We featured him awhile back when he won the 2400 Motel Puzzle. The 2400 Notel, was his last paper delivery, and he says he heard rumours that sometimes the boys (not him) would peak into the windows at night there to see what they might see. Not him though. He did admit that he used to sneak into the old theatre on Kingsway (across from Carleton). Whatta scamp.

For those who wish to celebrate Christmas meaning fully and biblically, need to focus


our hearts and minds on Jesus. Let's apply the message of Christmas in our lives.

Youth Connect Program by Still Moon Arts Society

Youth Connect links youth who belong to underserved communities to their environment, artistic creativity and one another.

In 2023, Still Moon led 3 cohort-based sessions for Renfrew-Collingwood youth. We were elated to have such wise young people participate.

In partnership with PosAbilities—a program that assists people with disabilities to lead meaningful lives—eager Connect participants visited Colour Me Local Dye Garden (CML) by Renfrew Ravine. We explored gardening, watering, and using natural dye. We learned a beautiful water song and experienced joy tending the land and each other.

Starting in late July, our second cohort began. The Frog Hollow Youth Advisory Committee experienced the joyful messiness of working together.

Our first sessions took place during a twoweek long adventure in natural building. Together with a group of dedicated volunteers, natural builders, and the Still Moon team, Connect participants mixed sand, clay and straw to build our very own Cob Garden Shed. Later in the month, youth returned to pick fresh coreopsis tinctoria (dyers tickseed) and prepared a dye bath. We produced vibrant orange cotton handkerchiefs.

Our final session was another messy hands-on experience! Connect participants worked to produce a folk style salve for minor wounds. Each participant went home with a small jar of this healing preparation. During this session, we co-created a silk scarf for guest facilitator, Lori Snyder. Many of the youth joined Lori during Moon Festival for an Orange Shirt workshop where we com-

bined decoloniality-focused reflection with further plantbased dye techniques.

The third and final cohort began, somewhat unsurprisingly, with a giant mountain of compost. 13 young people from the neighbourhood joined us to tuck our hardworking garden away for the winter with a blanket of nutrient rich soil.

Later, we used our last harvest to play with bound resist techniques, working with wooden blocks, marbles, and elastic bands to form patterns on cloth. We were lucky to have herbalist Laura Cisneros join us for a medicine-making session full of plant wisdom in early November, and during our native shrub planting session with Stewardship Manager, Adrian Avendano, we realized that digging a good hole on a steep hill is harder than it looks!


Life was less complicated in 1963, sixty years ago. I was a young girl only 3 years old. My parents had bought a brand-new house that summer, so it was our first Christmas there. We always had a fresh live Christmas tree, purchased from Simpsons-Sears garden centre in Burnaby. My parents kept it outside in a bucket of water until one week before Christmas, when it was brought inside where my dad put on the strings of coloured lights, including the popular bubble lights, and my mom decorated the tree with new ornaments, and some heirloom ones. She also carefully put on lead tinsel which was heavy and needed to be placed strand by strand on the branches. It was a beautiful sight.

My mom often ordered our toys from the Simpsons-Sears Christmas catalogue. The parcels were delivered to the house, wrapped in brown paper. One day my mom received a large box from the delivery man and hurried into her room to hide it. I followed her and wanted to know what was in the box. She took the item out and gave it to me. But even at that young age, I knew there had been something in the box, and I wasn't fooled. I sniffed the box, and I could detect the odour of a new doll. I began to cry. I cried until my mom gave in and gave me the doll! It was a lovely baby doll dressed in a christening gown and cap. She was impressed that I could tell what was in the box just by the smell.

I also got a new red velvet dress, sewn by my mom who hated sewing, a play stove with dishes and a plastic turkey, and a fire engine to ride on. My little sister got a wooden train set with a large track. It was a lovely Christmas.

Anya was the recipient of the Iris Garland Emerging Choreographer Award for the 2023/24 season for her work 'Paper Mountains.' Anya's company creates and presents live, digital, and site-adaptive performance works that provide space for emerging femme artists to tell their stories through movement. Stefan Nazarevich is a Ukrainian-Canadian musician and sound artist and a frequent interdisciplinary collaborator.


Lull is a mesmerizing movement piece that follows two beings drifting from one another. The work explores themes of water, it's calm, storms,



tides, and movements, embodied through a swarm of 25 dancers. "Lull" invites audiences to witness this work like an ocean.





Collingwood Winter Carnival

This year's Winter Carnival was again a wonderful success. I hope everyone stayed warm and toasty with lots of hot cocoa and holiday treats. I want to express how grateful I am to the organizers, and all of the volunteers, performs and artists who contribute to such a magical event.

Pay Transparency

Everyone deserves to be paid fairly and our communities are stronger when everyone is treated equally. However, too many women in B.C. are still making less than men. Last year, women in B.C. earned 17% less than men. The pay gap also disproportionately impacts Indigenous women, women of colour, and immigrant women, as well as women with disabilities and non-binary people. Beginning November 1, 2023, all employers in B.C. must include the expected pay or the **expected pay range for a specific job opportunity** that they advertise publicly.

Securing Small Business rebate program Recognizing the increased costs to businesses due to property crime and vandalism in rural and urban communities across the province, the Ministry of Jobs, Economic Development and Innovation has launched its \$10.5 million Securing Small Business Rebate Program, which will provide small businesses with funds for eligible commercial property crime and vandalism repairs, or to implement eligible preventative measures.

Businesses will be able to apply for as much as \$2,000 per business for the cost of repairs due to vandalism, and up to \$1,000 for prevention measures. Applications are retroactive to Jan. 1, 2023, to help businesses recoup costs incurred this year.

Beating the winter blues ***

Doctors have long understood that, in these months, most people begin to feel sad, less energetic, quieter and, often, sleepier.

Our moods aren't as cheerful as they were in the summer. Life seems more difficult. Happiness has gone.

In Vancouver, this end-

of-the-year sadness is stronger. The dark, cold, rainy days and constant gloom make many people feel tired and glum.

These feelings are often called the "blahs" or "The Blues" – like in the songs about trouble and heartache.

Because our bodies need light to create the chemicals in our brains that make us happy or energetic, we often feel sad and unhappy, more tired, and, sometimes, hopeless, in the darkest times of the year.

But not everyone is affected by the year-end blues. Some people live through the period with few problems while others are so sad they want to pull a blanket over their heads until springtime.

This last feeling is more formally termed seasonal affective disorder (SAD) – a form of mental illness caused by a lack of light.

Doctors say that the best way to survive the year-end months is by being involved in activities like exercise and spending more time with friends and family.

These keep you energized during the dark period. Joyful activities produce chemicals in the brain that make you happy and so help beat the blues.

Also, most religions have created something to help the (mostly western) world survive the blues.

It's called Christmas, which began as a religious ceremony in much of the Northern world as a way to cheer up people in the darkest time of year. Now, it is almost a month-long celebration that makes us happier.


So have a merry, happy Christmas, everyone. And try to remain cheerful.



Securing Small Business Rebate Program

On October 30th, the Province of BC announced the \$10.5 million <u>Securing Small Business Rebate Program</u> to address the rising costs of vandalism repairs and vandalism prevention. BIABC advocated for this program extensively over the last year and is pleased to see the government implement it.

The BC Chamber of Commerce has been selected to administer the program. Applications will be open on November 22, 2023, and will continue through January 31, 2025, for eligible expenses incurred between January 1, 2023, and December 31, 2024.

There are two streams of rebates available:

- Reparative available as a one-time rebate of up to \$2,000 for each of 2023 and 2024.
- Preventative available as a one-time rebate of up to \$1,000 for either 2023 or 2024.

Quick Facts:

- The rebate will be administered on a first-come, first-served basis for eligible applicants.
- Under the Reparative Stream, eligible vandalism repairs could include work undertaken to replace broken glass and remove graffiti.
- Under the Preventative Stream, eligible prevention measures include the purchase and installation of security cameras or gates.
